HARDWARE REVIEW

ELECTRIC STUDIO LIGHT PEN (Mk II)

The Electric Studio, Tape £19.95 Disc £26.95, All CPC's

The Electric Studio Light Pen is a fun drawing package with all sorts of wonderful features including: Brush of varying width, spray can also of varying width, Mirror draw (both horizontal & verticle) and all sorts of other goodies to mess around with.

When the loader is loaded it produces a menu of various options: Mode 0, Mode 1 etc. After choosing your option, an icon menu is displayed with the various drawing options on it. This is where the fun begins, choose your option and there is no stopping you for a couple of hours.

The pen is pixel accurate and it is even possible to sign your name on the screen. There is also an option to set up a window on the screen and scroll the contents in any direction (not very useful, but some pretty wonderful messes can be produced).

The save and load functions are a bit inconvenient, because the 'FL' option has to be chosen, then answer yes you do want to use the file option, then choose save or load and the last of all type in the name of the file that is to be Loaded/Saved.

From the Main Menu a Zoom option is available. There is a rectangular shaped cursor which can be moved around the screen and the area enclosed is magnified. This magnification allows pixel accurate detail. Files that have been done on the main light pen program can be loaded into the zoom utility and edited.

The printer dump option is pretty ordinary, by ordinary I mean that the printer options inevitably do not include the printer you have got, so the answer is to mess around a bit with the different choices until you find the one that works.

This is an entertaining piece of hardware for the first couple of weeks, but the thrill of being able to produce strange shapes on the screen soon wares off. This is not really an accurate design package and is not really much good for the serious side or design.
